About Speakers and Panel Members

Rachel Baynton; Proto-type Theater

Rachel is an artist, producer and academic working in cross-artform contexts. Her work focuses on collaboration, co-creation, and contemporary cultural production.

A graduate of Dartington College of Arts, Rachel is a professional director, writer, and producer of collaborative and participatory arts projects with national, and international reach. She has worked with diverse public groups around the UK, and with major commissioning partners such as the NHS, the RAF, and the BBC on projects including 'Fallen', performed live to commemorate and coincide with the 100th anniversary of the Battle of the Somme. Her practice includes work with and for community groups, including the creation of a large-scale processional performance with women across the City of Lincoln as part of their Suffrage 100 Commemorations, and a new community show for Paines Plough's Roundabout. She has worked on exhibitions and collections management at Lancaster University's Institute of Contemporary Arts (LICA), and is a regular presenter for BBC Radio Lincolnshire. She is Associate Chair of UK New Artists, who support the development of early-career artists from diverse backgrounds, and is on the board of Trustees for Zest Theatre, an Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation working to improve the lives and amplify the voices of children and young people through creative experiences. Rachel is Associate Professor and Creative Engagement Producer for the School of Creative Arts at the University of Lincoln, where she has steered the student-led Lincoln Company to critical acclaim.

Milly Bianchini (margomool)

Described by Line of Best Fit as 'convention-smashing', margomool blurs boundaries between genres, gender, audience and performer. Since landing in the London jazz-ish scene in 2020, the Leicester-born vocalist / producer has independently released three projects spotlighted by the likes of Jamz Supernova (BBC 1XTRA) and Emma-Jean Thackray (Worldwide Fm). margo has taken their solo act and band across the UK to prestigious stages like Love Supreme, bringing

along the inclusive FYE Cypher jam where the audience becomes part of the performance. The artist's practice is influenced by their seven-years experience as a music facilitator with people who are neurodiverse, over 60 and or trans+. Using the voice, rhythm and improvisation as the primary tools for creating, margomool encourages people to enter an embodied and caring conversation with themselves and the unique way they sonically express.

Suzannah Bedford

CEO and Creative Director of City Arts Nottingham, Suzannah also has over 20 years experience as a Creative Producer, Engagement Specialist and Mentor. Her expertise spans across all artforms and includes working directly in theatre, dance, community arts and arts funding. Suzannah fundamentally believes that people are at the heart of shaping and making new possibilities in the arts. She is passionate about broadening access to creative experiences of the highest quality, and ensuring that the arts sector represents the diversity of our society today.

Ellen Ranson

Ellen Ranson is an abstract painter, she lives and works in the North East of England. She received her MA at MIMA School of Art in 2022. She was a Paint fellow at Northumbria University (2018) and British Council Venice Fellow (2022) and on the Contemporary British Painting 2023 Shortlist. Recent exhibitions include: X - Contemporary British Painting at Newcastle Contemporary Art (group), Moonlight Dance on Warm Cement at the Gala Gallery (solo) and Queer Fringe at Pineapple Black (group). Ellen was commissioned by UKNA to undertake a mural, featuring the work of over 100 residents and school children from Sincil Bank, this brand new, inspiring and vibrant wall mural is a celebration of Sincil Bank, its people, places and the memories they have made here. The mural can be seen on Portland Street for Lincoln, LN5 7JX.

Vikki Jones

Vikki is a youth and community engagement specialist and is responsible for UKNA's wider engagement and Talent Development programme, connecting young people with the work of our new artists and encouraging more people to consider the arts as a potential career path. She works closely with our cultural and education partners to deliver collaborative projects that give communities fun and unique opportunities to engage with different artistic ideas and disciplines. Previously she has worked with theatre venues, dance houses, exam boards, national arts festivals and community programmes, all with the focus of getting more young people involved in practical arts and cultural activity. She strongly believes that creative and cultural opportunities make communities happier, healthier and safer and is passionately committed to getting as many people as possible to explore their creative selves.

Hannaa Hamdache is an artist and curator of mixed English and Algerian heritage. Based in Nottingham, UK, she holds a BA (Hons) in Fine Art and Art History from Kingston University London and an MLitt in Curatorial Practice (Contemporary Art) from the Glasgow School of Art.

She works to make the arts open for all through the use of humour and education. Her practice explores the idea of play: playing with context, the exhibition and the everyday. She has delivered curatorial projects working with Glasgow City Council and the Gallery of Modern Art in Glasgow; Somerset House and the Institute of Contemporary Arts in London; and Soho House Museum in Birmingham. UKNA Creative ThinkTank Member: Sarah Le Quang Sang (SLQS)

SLQS is a Franco-Vietnamese artist living in East London. Her work is multi-disciplinary and provocative: it questions the politics of space and who is excluded from it. She reclaims space by immersing herself and others in the public realm. SLQS makes and holds space as a woman, a person of mixed heritage, a foreigner, a mother, an artist and an equestrian. She invites her audience to decolonise spatial orders from imperialist, sexist and racist structures. SLQS works in a wide range of media that includes, but is not limited to, performance, live art, photography, writing, walking and visual art and is a member of the New Artist Collective (Lincoln)

UKNA Creative ThinkTank Member: Ana Silverio

Ana Silvério is an award-winning dance artist from Brazil. She received a First-class Honours degree in "Choreography, Methodology and Pedagogy of Dance" from the Saint Petersburg University of Humanities and Social Sciences, in Russia. She acts internationally as a teacher, choreographer, dancer and member of the judging committee for several art and dance festivals. Ana is based in York where she founded 'Terpsichoring'. A dance company and CIO aimed at the creation and touring of performances and the development of the dance field in the North of Yorkshire. The company was among the performers at the UKNA City TakeOver 2022. Ana likes to develop thoughtful, well-crafted and creative performances that explore topics in a multi-perspective way and storytelling in narrative and abstract forms. At the core of her movement vocabulary is ballet, Brazilian folk dances, physical theatre and contemporary dances.

UKNA Creative ThinkTank Member: Hoyee Tse

Hoyee was first trained as an art historian in European paintings in UCL and University of Amsterdam. With her postgraduate research in UCL Institute of Education, she expanded her interest in the relationship between art and society of the past to the digital representation and preservation of visual culture of the present. Currently, she is the Design Trust Curatorial Fellow in the Royal College of Art, developing a socially engaged co-curation model for contemporary art and crafts collection through digital platform.

UKNA Creative ThinkTank Member: Gaynor Tutani

Gaynor Tutani (Art Adlib) is a curator, producer and writer who merges her various arts, culture, community and educational passions to produce exhibitions, events and commentaries on art and curating. Her speciality is in public programming - hosting music performances, talks, interviews and poetry programs. She is the Co-founder of EARTHworks [Artists], a curatorial duo that is dedicated to promoting creative collaborations through an intergenerational lens. Their work aims to raise awareness of the benefits of art and art making practices to health and well-being, alongside global issues such as climate change, equality and diversity.

David McLeavy

David McLeavy is an Artist, Curator, Writer & events producer based in Sheffield, UK. As an Artist, he works in a range of ways including sculpture, text and installation. He is currently working on his debut film, which explores the intersections of endurance sport, mental health and chronic illness. As a Curator and Producer, he is currently working on a number of independent projects and exhibitions, along with being the Events Manager at the charity Paces, the Founder and Editor of the web platform YAC | Young Artists in Conversation and the Chair of the Board of Trustees at Our Big Picture. Between 2021 - 2022 he was the Curator at Absolutely Cultured leading on the artistic programme at Humber Street Gallery, Hull and between 2017 -2021 he was the Director of the contemporary arts organisation Bloc Projects, Sheffield. As well as working with artists to build exhibitions, he works on a series of independent projects ranging from artist mentoring, organisational consultancy, devising and delivering monitoring and evaluation frameworks and advising on professional development programmes for creatives. Previously he was also the Co-Founder of the cycling clothing and lifestyle brand Curbar with artist James Clarkson, 1/3 of the curatorial group Basic Channel, Co-Director of the international residency and exhibition programme Picnic Picnic with Pippa Cook and an Associate Lecturer at Sheffield Hallam University. He was also the Chair of Trustees at Turf Projects, Croydon, and is currently on the advisory board for PINK, Manchester. Prior to focusing on curatorial projects, he made work as an artist exhibiting widely across the UK and in some instances internationally.

Benedict Carpenter van Barthold

Benedict Carpenter van Barthold (Ben) is a consultant and UKNA Trustee, who has been an artist for 30 years. He has tasted both success and failure, and is well aware of the pitfalls and opportunities that lie before any artist as they make their way. Ben trained as an artist at Chelsea College of Art and Design and the Royal College of Art, and has a PhD from Manchester Metropolitan University. He was awarded the Jerwood Sculpture Prize in 2001. He has exhibited at the Venice Biennale and completed a number of permanently situated commissions in the UK and abroad. As a consultant, Ben works with emergent technology companies at the intersection of art and technology, to help them attain their goal of democratising access to art and culture.

Sam Tahmessebi

Sam Tahmassebi is a London based visual artist working in a range of mediums including photography, sculpture, paint and installation. Sam Tahmassebi's practice embodies a social commentary, a way of mediating social, political, economic and psychological theory to an audience through any medium that depicts it best. Sam Tahmassebi's practice is concerned with the notion of artistic articulation and art's role in interrogating and materialising critical voice. He investigates psychological, social and political issues, which always emanate from his surroundings and analysis of them. Sam perceives his subjectivity as an agentive site through which to navigate various layers of the contemporary social context, including by mapping experienced 'realities' onto theoretical strands to assimilate a firmer understanding of the issue(s) at hand. His aim is to secure more clinical – or rather – more objective grounds to produce work. Sam is a member of the New Artist Collective (Lincoln).

Georgia Preece

Georgia Preece is an artist, poet, writer and workshop facilitator based in Lincoln, she is Visual Director and Environment Editor for Radical Art Review and an MA Fine Art graduate of the University of Lincoln. Preece's artistic practice is rooted in political discourse and human emotion, developed from a body of ongoing research, she uses diverse methods of visual practice to explore topics such as: the performativity of protest, working classness and the claimant, environmental concerns, and the liminal space between classes occupied by the working class graduate. She has recently developed a series of workshops that she has been delivering to creative groups in Lincoln and online to facilitate group and individual manifesto writing, allowing participants to reflect on their practice and create space for hopes and aspirations. Georgia is a member of the New Artist Collective (Lincoln).







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
